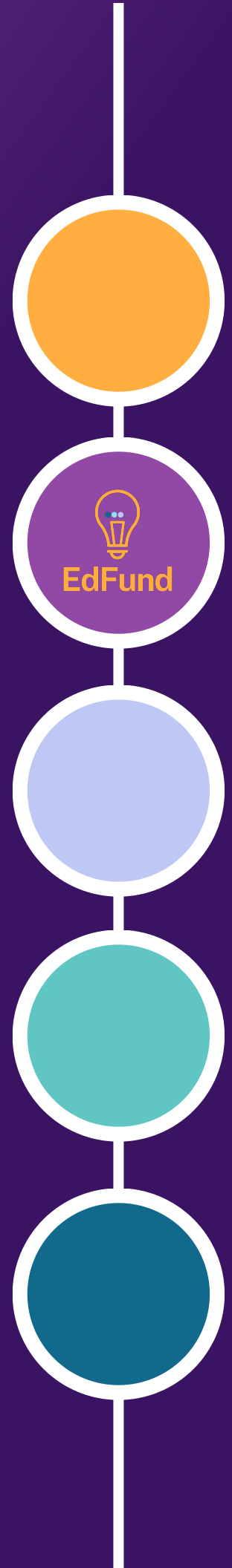

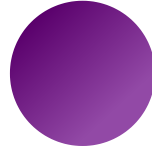

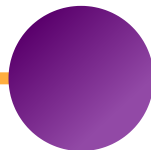
EdFund envisions evidence-based state funding policies that align with district and student needs. To achieve this vision, we need new research to support the decision-making of policymakers and advocates who advise how \$800 billion is raised and spent for public schools annually.

To support this mission, we are launching a competitive opportunity for graduate students and post-doctoral researchers to deepen their engagement in education policy research, advocacy, and stakeholder engagement. This cohort-based program will bring together twelve participants for an intensive six-workshop series, featuring discussions with leading experts in research, legislation, and journalism. Participants will gain valuable insights into education funding and policy translation while developing practical skills to bridge the gap between research and policymaking. Each participant will receive a \$1,000 stipend upon successful completion of the program.

Program Overview

EdFund is dedicated to making research more policy relevant. In service of that goal, we are offering an exciting competitive opportunity for graduate students and post-docs to take a deep dive into education policy research, advocacy, and stakeholder engagement. This cohort will include up to twelve individuals who will participate in a six-workshop series and engage with experts in the research, legislative, and journalism fields. Each participant will earn a \$1,000 stipend at the end of the term.

Benefits & Expectations

Workshop participants will receive financial support for their ongoing or completed research project as well as access to additional resources to support their work. Benefits for workshop attendees include:

- A \$1,000 stipend awarded at the end of the term upon successful attendance and participation in four two-hour virtual workshops and two in-person events.
- Virtual workshops are held once a month during the week. Workshop times will be scheduled in accordance with fellow availability.
- Opportunities to revise, brainstorm, and workshop research projects
- Data and policy insights from expert partners
- Assistance with promoting and platforming findings to advocates, policymakers, and journalists
- Membership in a community of practice with two in person meetings
- Curated opportunities to discuss your work and interact with high impact policymakers and journalists

Workshop One: October

In-Person Session:

Exploring the Landscape of School Finance

By leading experts and practitioners in school finance, policy, and research.

Attend to learn:

- The central questions and ongoing debates shaping the field of school finance, and how different perspectives influence policy decisions.
- How to connect your research to real-world policy conversations, ensuring your work resonates beyond academia.
- A deeper understanding of how funding decisions are made, including the collaboration, tradeoffs, and structures that shape outcomes.
- Strategies for engaging with peers and experts to build meaningful connections and foster long-term collaboration.
- An opportunity to meet co-fellows in person and begin building a strong, collaborative network.

Workshop Two: November

Introduction to Policy and Its Connection to Research

Presented by education policy experts specializing in school funding and the interplay between local, state, and federal funding systems.

Tune in to learn:

- The key terms and subtle distinctions that shape how researchers, policymakers, and advocates talk about school funding, and how those conversations translate into action.
- A closer read of funding models, not just how they're designed on paper, but how they behave in practice.
- A look beneath the surface of school finance systems: the policies, tradeoffs, and implementation realities that determine how dollars actually flow.
- An inside perspective on the policies and structures that determine how funding is raised, distributed, and put into practice across schools and communities.

Workshop Three: January

From Research to Reform: How School Funding Policy Changes Happen

Presented by advocates who have recently reformed or revised school funding reform in their state.

Tune in to learn:

- The drivers and conditions that lead to changes in school funding formulas
- Strategies for navigating the political dynamics and building support for policy reform
- The role of research in informing, shaping, and advancing policy decisions
- Lessons from translating evidence into actionable policy change at the state level.

Workshop Four: February

The Data Reality: the Future of Education Finance Research

Presented by seasoned researchers and data analysts who have experience working with national and state level data.

Tune in to learn:

- How to identify reliable data sources for policy research
- Best practices for data cleaning and organization
- The role of a data dictionary in ensuring consistency and clarity in research
- The emerging tools for accessing clean, accurate, and longitudinal school finance data
- How to navigate and apply new data resources for research, analysis, and advocacy
- Key considerations in how education finance data is collected and maintained
- The implications of reduced federal capacity on data quality, availability, and long-term research use.

Workshop Five: March - AAFP

In-Person Session:

Cross-Over Event with Incoming Fellows

Attend to Learn:

- About the incoming group of Policy Fellows and the research shaping their work.
- The experience of previous cohort members and how they've translated what they learned into impact across research, policy, and practice.
- How to stay engaged in education finance spaces and bring your research into policy, advocacy, and journalism spaces.

Workshop Six: April

Talking the Talk: Translating Research for Broader Audiences

Presented by nationally recognized communications strategists known for bridging the gap between rigorous research and real-world impact through effective public messaging.

Tune in to learn:

- How to simplify complex findings for different audiences.
- Best practices for effectively communicating research to non-experts.
- Tips and strategies for ensuring accuracy while making findings accessible
- The difference between generalist journalists and subject-matter experts in education reporting.
- Best practices for engaging with the media and ensuring accurate representation of research.
